
















Immigrant (v.)	Someone who enters a different country to live there permanently.	The United States is often called a “melting pot” because it is a nation of <u>immigrants</u> .	
Moral (n.) Morally (adj.)	Ideas about what people think is right and wrong.	He feels he has a <u>moral</u> responsibility to help the poor.	
Ethic (n.) Ethical (adj.) Ethically (adv.)	Acting in a way that is right and good.	She knows that it is <u>ethically</u> wrong to accept money and gifts as a politician.	
Empathy (n.)	To share and understand the experiences and emotions of another person.	They feel great <u>empathy</u> for the poor because they used to be poor themselves.	

<p>Rehabilitation (n.)</p>	<p>To bring a person back to normal and healthy condition after an injury or problem.</p>	<p>The <u>rehabilitation</u> program helps ex-criminals learn the skills they need for jobs and life.</p>	
<p>Deportation (n.) Deport (v.)</p>	<p>To force a person to leave a country.</p>	<p>The <u>deportation</u> of over 2 million immigrants since 2008 has separated many families.</p>	
<p>Refugee (n.)</p>	<p>Someone who is forced to leave a country because of war, religion, or political reasons.</p>	<p>Thousands of <u>refugees</u> have left Syria because of war.</p>	

<p>Discrimination (n.)</p>	<p>The practice of treating people unfairly from other people.</p>	<p>Many Muslims have faced <u>discrimination</u> because of their religion.</p>	
<p>Attorney (n.)</p>	<p>A person who helps people when it comes to the law and court.</p>	<p>The <u>attorney</u> helps many immigrants learn the law.</p>	
<p>Convicted (v.)</p>	<p>To prove that someone is guilty of crime in court of law.</p>	<p>The attorney found evidence to <u>convict</u> the robber.</p>	

<p>Reform (v.) (n.)</p>	<p>To make something better by removing or correcting problems.</p>	<p>Many people in the United States want to <u>reform</u> the immigration laws.</p>	
<p>Criminalize (v) Criminal (n.)</p>	<p>To make an activity illegal.</p>	<p>The government has the power to <u>criminalize</u> using phones while driving.</p>	
<p>Exclude (v.)</p>	<p>To prevent someone from being part of a group or from doing something.</p>	<p>Do not <u>exclude</u> your little sister from the game.</p>	

<p>Punish (v.)</p>	<p>To make someone suffer from a crime or bad behavior.</p>	<p>She will <u>punish</u> her son for stealing money from her purse.</p>	
<p>Undocumented (adj.) (n.)</p>	<p>Not having the official documents needed to enter, live, and work in a country legally.</p>	<p>The <u>undocumented</u> students work very hard to go to college.</p>
